Monitoring visits to Pilot Project locations, May 2007

Innovation suits Ukraine

During May 2007 three European experts in sustainable tourism development visited 10 pilot projects located in various parts of rural Ukraine and monitored their progress, offering support and advice to the project promoters. The trips were demanding as time was short and distances in Ukraine are hard to cover. Nevertheless the project experts were welcome by the pilot project promoters in the typically warm Ukrainian way, eager to talk about their projects and give them a taste of rural Ukraine during their visits.

Experts had a lot to talk about with the promoters: besides project progress, they monitored how progress had been achieved, whether the action plans that have been set in place were implemented and if the set goals had been achieved. They also identified problems in the implementation of the projects and gave advice.

The experts returned with positive feelings regarding the future of the pilot projects as some of them had clearly showed that were being implemented on a solid basis by devoted promoters. Project promoters showed professionalism and a good understanding on how to identify and overcome the various hurdles of setting up a sustainable rural tourism project in a developing country like Ukraine. This gives us a good reason to think positively for the future of these projects. Having established an active relationship with the project for over a year, pilot project promoters are being considered as members of the transnational project team and will be supported after the end of the project.



Below are some comments from the experts regarding their visits:

Dr. Marko Koscak

Year 2008 will be the year of Tourism and Resorts in Ukraine (declared by the President). In this light it will be very important to attract key national and international players to attend the final Conference of the project in September and allow both EURACADEMY experts and participants to present their experiences in order to gain some further attention and support for the implementation of pilot projects. It will be pity if all the energy and know-how gathered during this project will not get final approval and notice by national and international bodies which can (possibly) further assist the implementation of the projects started by the participants.

Dr. Klaus Ehrlich

The general expectation or attitude from the side of the promoters still seems to expect direct financial support or funding. This situation is well known for me because it is identical in most southern European countries like Spain, Greece, or Italy where public subventions, grants, or subsidies have a historically important role in rural areas. Such confusion between "investment" and "development" is frequently at the heart of failures in planning policies. To overcome this purely financial expectation towards outside assistance is a critical task because money never will help to overcome the main constraint to development: the mind and mentality of people. Two pretty contrasting examples amongst the three visited, are proof for this. Especially in rural tourism, efficient and pragmatic management of existing resources is usually a lot more effective and generates more income than traditional investment-based projects. If we achieved an - even small - shift and change in this mentality through the project, more was done for long term sustainability of projects than providing big investment grants.



Dr. Ela Strzelecka

Lack of financial resources is one of the main constraints as project promoters are trying to find additional funding but the results have not been very successful. Moreover not all regions have a regional strategy that includes tourism and thus makes it difficult to prepare tourism development proposals, without a solid planning basis.

IBPP Closing Conference, 19 July 2007, Kiev

In July the project team attended the Closing Conference of the Tacis Institution Building Partnership Programme (IBPP). IBPP is a programme of the European Commission in the context of EuropeAid, run in Ukraine by the E.C national Delegation. TACIS IBPP co-finances several projects in Ukraine, one of which is this project.



During the conference the project team had the opportunity to meet colleagues from Ukraine and Europe, talk with members of the Delegation and get to know more about other projects implemented in Ukraine. Vassilis Tsipidis, transnational project coordinator from Euracademy Association and Tetyana Pashchenko, national project coordinator from the Carpathian Foundation, Ukraine office, presented the project: Developing Sustainable Rural Tourism – Capacity Building for Rural Development Leaders, receiving a lot of attention by other conference participants.



ECORYS of Netherlands, the organisation which evaluates the IBPP actions in Ukraine, presented a very useful initiative, the creation of a web-portal for all IBPP projects, where each project can showcase its results, news and activities, providing ample space for networking among project partners. The pilot projects, some of which have shown great progress so far, will be presented during the conference, giving their promoters the chance to showcase their achievements and attract attention from Ukrainian NGOs and regional and national authorities for further support.

Pilot Project Vasyl Kobyluk – Developing a Tourism Centre

Vasyl is a very professional and determined individual. He has set up a project in Verhovyna – Ivano-Frankivsk, his area of residence. Vasyl has started building a Tourist Information Centre, using sustainable materials and building techniques, which is nearly completed. This building will also house the Mountain Rescue team, which will add a lot to the tourism product offered in the area. Vasyl has also planned to offer trekking and hiking tours too in nearby areas, giving the visitor the possibility to see not only the natural but also the cultural landmarks. The project, so far has been self-financed, a fact that shows a lot about Vasyls devotion and determination.
